EXCERPT: Sale of land to foreigners would be subject to gov't approval under a bill that passed its first reading in the Knesset yesterday. By a vote of 22-2 the Lands Bill (Transfer of Rights to Foreigners) presented by Justice Minister Moshe Nissim, was referred to the law Committee... The impetus for the submission of the bill, it is generally thought, was the continuing purchase of tracts of land in Zichron Ya'acov and Binyamina by a group of German Christians headed by Emma Berger. The bill says anyone who intends to sell his land to a foreigner must first submit all the details to the director of the Israel Lands Administration (ILA), and offer the sale to him. If the director is willing to buy the property, the seller will be barred from selling it to a foreigner. He can then decide not to sell at all, or to sell it to the director—either at the price offered by the foreigner or at the price determined by the gov't assessor, whichever is lower.

The presentation of the government bill was a triumph for Dov Shilansky (Herut) who has been campaigning against Emma Berger's land purchases for two years...Shilansky said in the debate that in the past ten years missionaries and other groups hostile to Israel have acquired "tremendous tracts" that could serve as bases for hostile activities...Shlomo Gross (Agudat Yisrael) claimed the bill does not go far enough. There might well be people in Emma Berger's group who have acquired Israel citizenship and are buying up land in Galilee. (END EXCENDIS)

For the first time Christians--1,000 of them from 23 countries-came to Jerusalem to celebrate the festival with the Jewish people, and to show their solidarity with the State of Israel at this critical moment, following the departure of so many embassies from Israel's capital. This deep desire reflects that of the "Almond Branch" association in Jerusalem, whose aim is to promote love and understanding between Jews and Christians. It was crystalized in the idea of an international Christian celebration during the Feast of Talernacles ... from Sept. 23 to Oct. 2nd .... Pres. Yitzhak Navon told the delegates, "Your presence had caused us to be comforted." Gifts to Israel from some of the delegations included the sum of over IS 10,000 from the Near East Ministry of Voorthuizen, Holland. This donation will be shared by two community service projects: the Rotary Foundation Fund which provides scholarships for Arab and Jewish youngsters, and Lifeline for the Old. Shaare Zedek Hospital is richer today by \$20,000 given by Norwegian Christians ....

Jan Willem van der Hoeven who, with his wife Widad, was involved in the program from its inception, announced: "The feast will bulminate in a prayer march to the Knesset. We will then walk to our new Christian Embassy to be difficially opened by Jerusalem Mayor Teddy Kollek." During the festival Widad made a statement profound in its perception of relative values: "I am a Christian Arab, NOT an Arab Christian. Spiritual values must take precedence over national loyalties." Opening the Embassy at 22 Rehov Rashba, Mayor Kollek confessed that he found it one of the most moving ceremonies of his life and sealed the official acceptance of the embassy with the gracious words, "There is only one Jerusalem -- ours and yours..." Said Jay Rawlings: "As a direct result of this Feast of Tabernacles celebration, including Christian leaders and representatives from 23 nations, we have gone ahead to establish a Christian Embassy in Jerusalem. This will not be an embassy in the political sense of the word, but in the biblical sense, in that we will be ambassadors for Israel and for the principles of G-d that Israel represents. This embassy will be a focal point for Christians all over the world, a place they can relate to in Israel." Numerous telegrams were received from Christian leaders throughout the world ....

Meeting with Chief Rabbi Shlomo Goren...was for many of the delegates the supreme moment of the week. Rabbi Goren told them: "Your sympathy, solidarity, and belief in the future of Israel—this to us is tremendous. We consider you part of the fulfilment of the prophetic vision expressed by Zechariah in chapter 14. Your presence here will always remain a golden page in the book of eternity in heaven. May the Lord bless you out of Zion." The hope and prayer of both participants and planners for Succot 1981 is NEXT YEAR IN JERUSAIEM. (END)

QUOTE : A strong anti-Israeli mesolution was adopted by the central committee of the WCC at its conference in Geneva, which ended last Friday. The WCC resolution described Israel's recently enacted Jerusalen Law as a "threat to peace," which "most dangerously undermines all efforts towards a just solution of the Middle East problem." The WCC resolution also urged member churches to "exert pressure on Israel through their respective governments to withhold any action on Jerusalem, the future of which should be included in negotiations on selfdetermination involving Israel and the Palestinian people." The central committee suggested consultations with member churches in the area and with the Vatican, to explore possibilities of finding the best solution to the problem of Jerusalem. Israeli sources in Geneva said privately that the resolution reflected the increasing politicisation of the Geneva-based WCC, and the anti-Israel line of its general secretary, the Mev. Philip Potter, of the West Indies. (END)

EXCERPT: In the midst of Jerusalem's rebuilt Jewish Quarter, among the synagogues and yeshivot, are two things which give Father Bargil Pixner of Dormition Abbey "great hope" for the future relationship between Christians and Jews in Israel: One is the still-standing 15th century minaret near the Ramban synagogue, built by the mother of a beadle (synagogue official) who converted to Islam a fter a qua rrel with his neighbors. The other is an archaeological garden preserving the remains of St. Mary's Crusader Church. "The fact that Israelis would not only excavate a church used by German knights, but then go on to rehabilitate its remains in the middle of the Jewish Quarter is something I find extraordinary," remarks Father Pixner, a Benedictine monk who is the moderator for the Circle of Ecumenical Friends, an umbrella or anization for verious churches in Jerusalem. "It is proof of the great respect the Jewish people have for the religious feelings of others."

It is commonplace knowledge that the Jews' long and bitter experience as a minority has begot a sensitive and constructive policy towards Israel's minorities, who a re free to worship as they wish in protected holy places. What is not well-known is that partly on account of the political support these Christian minorities receive from outside the borders of the State of Israel, they are also accorded many tax and other privileges which not even Jewish immigrants receive. Lately, though, relations between the church communities and the Israel government have become somewhat tense. Even Father Pixner has expressed the need for "written, internationally-anchored guarantees" to safeguard the status of Christians in Jerusalem. FACTORS: The strain in relations is a product of two factors: a recent spate of vandalism against Christian institutions in Jerusalem which Isra eli officia is themselves describe as "very severe and without precedent," and growing realization among all parties that the status of the Holy City might soon become a real negotiating topic. Christian notables freely admit they are using the vanalism as an issue, and taking advantage of the state's democratic nature, in order to stake their claim now to a share in Jerusalem's future. "We think it's the right time to speak up," says Father Ignazio Mancini, director of Jerusalem's Christian Information Center who has been here as a Franciscan monk since 1935. A similar view is expressed by Christian officials specializing in church-government relations. "We need to consolidate our rights a nd improve on them, and new is the optimal time to do it," he says.

The rights and privileges that the 122,000 Christians in Israel and the adminiXstered territories receive from the government is a direct result of their dual personality. On the one hand, the sects are representatives of powerful forces outside the country. The 70,000 Catholics under Isra el's jurisdiction (Latins, Greeks, Maronites, Syrians and Armenians) have-to put it mildly-a friend at the Vatican. The area's 2,800 Anglicans can turn to Canterbury. And the 42,000 Greek Orthodox (the largest and most powerful Christian & roup in Israel) can seriously affect the state of relations between Israel and nearby Greece. These are only a few examples....On the other hand, these groups are minorities three-times-over, "explains Dr. Daniel Rossing, director of the Christian Commu-(MORE) nities' Department in the Ministry of Religious Affairs. First, most local Christians are Arabs, a people who are themselves a minority vis-a -vis the Jews. Second, as Christians they are a minority within a predominantly Moslem Arab society. And third, since there are 35 different Christian groups in Israel, they a re also a minority within the Christian population itself-unless they belong to a dominant group like the Greek Orthodox. "The Ministry's job is extremely delica te," notes Dr. Rossing. "We must compensate for the Christiens' minority status, while at the same time act as though conducting diplomatic relations with foreign powers. ".... In addition, Christians enjoy almost total autonomy here. For instance, their 16 different courts are operated a nd financed by their own communities. In the Moslem and Druze courts, officials are appointed and pa id by the government. Summing up the relationship, Dr. Rossing observes: "There is among Christians a growing trust in the Israel government's ability to protect and administer the Holy Places. This is something the years themselves have had to prove. ".... The Israel government believes that its support of the Lebanese Christians is another example of its good intentions. But the majority of this country's Christians do not see it that way. As one church official puts it: "In Lebanon, Israel is aiding the Maronites. Now, how is a rival g roup-such as the Greek Orthodox-supposed to relate to that?" Another official used the example of Ikrit and Bir'am in an attempt to show how Israel's assistance to the Christians in Lebanon is purely politically motivated ... Ikrit and Bir'am were not the only sore points existing between local Christians and the government prior to the recent outbreak of vandalism. There have been frequent complaints over the difficulty that Arab Christians supposedly have in returning to Israel after living overseas. Then, -: in early 1978, the Knesset passed the so-called anti-missionary law, making it a legal offense to give or accept any kind of material benefit in return for a change of religion. Despite the fa ct that to this day, no one has been arrestedr and files have not been opened on account of the statute, many clergymen were outra ged by the mere passage of the bill, authored by a member of the unlta-orthodox Agudat Israel party, Later in the year, the temporary occupation of the Coenaculum (the Last Supper room) on Mount Zion by students of the Diaspora Yeshiva caused further strain in church-state relations....SFORADIC: The "vandalism," as Israeli officials refer to it, or "anti-Christian violence," as it is called by some church personages, continued sporadically throughout the past winter, In most of the incidents, though ; the authorities have been quick to react. Elsewhere, windows were smashed and slogans scrawled at the following places in Jerusalem, all of which have a "missionary" orientation: Baptist House on Hanarkis Street, the Zion Bookshop on the Street of the Prophets, the World Bible Society Bookshop on Jaffa Road and the Torch Bookshop on Shlomzion Hamalka Street. One adult has been arrested, and investigations are continuing in the few other cases. We anwhile, the Jerusalem Municipality and the Religious Affairs Ministry have repaired all the damaged property at their own expense. This "wave" of incidents, as Dr. Rossing calls it, resulted in a common public statement signed by Father Fixner, Father Mancini, and the Rev. R. Kreider of Israel's United Christian Council. They wrote that "the impression is persistent and pervasive within the Christian community that the civil a uthorities have so far failed to exhaust all the possibilities open to them to curb such manifestations of anti-Christian fanaticism." After prodding from Mayor Kollek, Prime Minister Menahem Begin Wasued his own statement, in which he said that "the A uthorities will not tolerate acts of this kind. By the Laws of Israel, all faiths enjoy absolute freedom to their shrines..... The Authorities, therefore, will do their utmost to prevent the recurrence of such intolerable criminal acts." A second sta tement was then issued by the three clergy, expressing deep satisfaction with the Prime Minister's reply. So much for the official record.

CONCERN: Unofficially, the affair caused a number of clergy and well-informed Jewish observers to voice concern a bout the direction in which Israeli society is going. It has also awakened the deep-rooted suspicion the Christian clergy have for the religious factions within the present government. One person in the Israeli establishment expressed the feeling in these words: "There has emerged a certa in disrespect for law and order in this country, a feelling among extreme ist groups that with this government you can get away with perhaps more than you could with the Ma'arach. I therefore see a connection between the stone throwing by orthodox Java on the Ramot Moad, the illegal settlements and the (MONE)

vandalism." Many Christians also recall that Jews, too, have been ha rassed by Jewish religious extrem.ists. Says Father Pixner: "We are aware of what has occurred in Leba non and what is now taking place in Iran. I am afraid the society is going in the same direction in thisland." Despite the favorable remarks a bout the former Labor administration, the consensus among Christians seems to be that Israel governments will come and go, some will be better than others, and that the only perma nent safeguard against what Father Pixner calls "the fear of Jewish Khomeinism" is an internationally guaranteed statue obeyed by whatever power controls Jerusalem in the future, "It is a question of principle, not a matter of the performance of any particular Israel government; we are fighting not against Israel, but for something," remarks one top Christian official.... These frustrations are not likely to be appeased. Christian officials point out that they are in the business of improving their position in the area and the way to do this is by trying to act from a position of strength. As one cleric says: "If we a retaking advantage of Israel's democracy, that's something Israel must point out to the world. It's certainly not our job to do so." Though Dr. Rossing's department has registered moderate success in the field of public relations-largely by arranging tours for Christian leaders to places like museums of Jewish history and by the quarterly publication of Christian News From Israel-the Israel government as a whole has been markedly deficient in this area....Still, despite all these unfortunate incidents, it can be said that the government's policy of dispensing privileges to the Christian mincrities, along with the general attitude of tolerance that exists among most Isra elis, has wrought a mood of goodwill between the faiths. This was made plain to me during an interview with a Christian official in Jerusalem, a man who was more critical than most about the state of affairs between the government and the churches. After making a number of accusations against Israeli policy towards the Christians-accusations not supported by other clerics with whom I spoke ' be added "that despite everything, Israel is by far the most agreeable place in the Middle East for Christians."

The Director of the Israel Office of the AJC, Dr. Yaacov Dov Resnikoff, explained that it was the desire of the visitor to see firsthand the problems of the region in preparation for the resolutions on the subject which are anticipated at the organizations's conference, which is of the highest importance in this field in the USA, although conservative circles are not found among them.

As will be recalled, a toplevel delegation of the NCC toured Israel some time ago and prepared draft resolutions, but the president was unable to join the delegation at that time. Howard will meet, among others, with P.M. Begin, the acting Chairman of the High Court of Justice Haym Cohen, and the State Attorney Gavriel Back (with whom he will discuss especially the problems of human rights in the Occupied Territories). He will also meet with the UE Ambassador Samuel Lewis, with the Secy-Gen of Mapam, Victor Shomtov, with the Chairman of the Labour Party, Shimon Feres, with Mayor Teddy Kollek and senior officials, with the writer Ibrahim Shabat, with representatives of the Interfaith Committee, "Peace Now," and the "Black Fanthers." It appears that he will be permitted also to meet with Falestinian personalities notwithstanding the restrictions of movement and speech imposed upon them. The visitor will also tour Yad V'shem" (Holocaust Museum), in Ramat Golan, in Kiryat Shmone and in the Triangle. Beforecoming to Israel, he had met with President Anwar Sadat, in Jordan with King Hussein, and according to plan, met for a t alk with PLO head Yasser Ara fat inBeirut.

QUOTE: The president of the U.S. National Council of Churches, which several months ago called for an "open dialogue" between the U.S. and the Palestine Liberation Organization, arrived jesterday in Israel for a four-day visit. The Rev. William Howard arrived from Egypt accompanied by two NCC officials, Joan Campbell and Richard Butler. Their trip follows a visit in March of an NCC Middle East panel, boycotted by most Jewish organizations and Israeli officials because of what was felt to be one-sided approach. The panel later called for a dialogue between the U.S. and the PLO. Rev. Howard was met at the airport by David Efrati, the Foreign Ministry official in charge of Christian Affairs, and he is due to meet with Prime Minister Menahem Begin tomorrow. He will also meet with Christians in East Jerusalem and the West Bank. The three are due to visit Jordan, Syria and Lebanon as well.

Meanwhile, another group of Christians from around the world, representing a number of evangelical sects, has come to open an "International Christian Embassy" in Jerusalem tomorrow to compensate the capital for the loss of 13 foreign emassies. They are taking part in a special Succot gathering, and will first publicize their cause in a demonstration at the Knesset.

The 54-year-old Baptist minister is the youngest person and the second black to head the body which includes all major American Ehristian denominations, except the Roman Catholics and the Southern Baptists, and claims a membership of 40 million. In an interview with the JEHUSALEM POST in Jerusalom, he expressed his full backing of the NCC panel which visited the Mideast in March and recommended that the US negotiate with the PLO. The panel also called on Israel to recognize "Palestinian national rights and undertake to establish no more settlements in the West Bank or Gaza, while calling on the PLO to cease all acts of violence and renounce its rejection of Israel." One of my confidents has informed me that the visitor, "a personality of great stature," was clearly impressed by t he hospitality extended to him, and particularly by the reception provided with the despatch of David Efrati, a senior official in the Foreign Ministry in Ecclesiastical Affairs, to the airport upon their arrival. He was especially interested in the fact that persons like Shemtov and Kollek as well as circles such as "Peace Now" and the Interfaith Committee display openness and maximal undersranding of the Palestinian problem. Shabat, who received the visitors at their request in his home in Nazareth, told them that the mistake of the PLO and the "rejectionist" states was that they related to Israel as a xxxxxxx "strange planting" in the region, while the mistake of the Govt of Israel was its denial of the right of self-determination for the Palestinian people. And so the British Council of Christians & Jews was born. "The object of the council was obviously to do what it could about the problem of antisemitism. But we defined our purpose in the broadest possible terms," says one of its founders, Rev. Wm. Simpson. "We aimed to promote understanding and cooperation between Christians and Jews in dealing with any problems of prejudice and intolerance." Rev. Simpson is now working on a book about the development of Christian-Jewish understanding, an activity to which he has devoted most of his life. That, indeed, is what he was doing during the 3 months he spent as guest of the city of Jerusalem at... Mishkenot Sha'ananim... Rev. Simpson has always maintained that the problems facing Christians and Jews together are closely linked to current world problems. "I believe that together we should be able to create a peaceful solution in the long run to world problems in general," he says. "The mere fact that Christians and Jews meet and talk to each other--let alone

work together on committees, social and communityprojects, study groups, summer camp programs and the like—has gone a long way toward overcoming prejudice at the grass-roots level. And it has certainly promoted considerable understanding."

One of the most e ncouraging developments has been the proliferation of such councils and committees in Europe and in North & South America. The Interfaith Committee in Israel also fincludes Muslims. In 1976 the International Council held its conference in Jerusalem. The Theme was "ISRAEL: SIGNIFICANCE & HEALITY." "Prior to the conference," he said, "a state of confusion existed in a good many Christian minds. The problem revolved around seeing Israel in a traditional, theological light in contrast to the contemporary political reality. We were able to resolve a good deal of misunderstanding..." In spite of the difficulties ahead, Nev. Simpson is optimistic both with regard to Christian-Jewish understanding and to international relations generally. "I can't surrender the belief that all that has happened down through the ages has had a creative and redemptive purpose," he /says.(END)
